What's Next?

Many of you may be wondering what will happen when grant funding for Haywood Community Connections comes to an end. It is not possible to answer that question unequivocally at this time.

It is important to note that Haywood County, municipalities, nonprofits, businesses and individuals have been very supportive during the grant period. As grant funds come to an end this spring, we trust that the work completed by Haywood Community Connections will provide the strongest argument for the need to continue the program. The Robert Wood Johnson Foundation's Community Partnerships for Older Adults Initiative (CPFOA) recently published a report based on outcomes from its 15 projects across the nation. Our program was one of those 15. The report stands as proof that partnerships work.

Haywood Community Connections has:

- Improved supports for older adults by asking them what their needs and preferences are and involving them, along with a wide range of traditional and non-traditional partners, in develop-

ing a comprehensive, community-wide strategic plan to expand and improve local efforts to respond to those needs.

- Made it possible to combine and allocate resources more effectively and meet needs more efficiently. The Byzantine maze of local long term care services and supports behaves more like a coordinated system in which providers, consumers, and community leaders work together toward shared goals. Perhaps most importantly, the partnership has

- Strengthened our community. By bringing everyone to the table to work together, it has increased connections among neighbors and reduced barriers between agencies and sectors.

In the current economy, states and communities have tough choices to make selecting programs to fund. Problems facing older adults and their families will grow worse as the senior population increases, budget cuts continue, and more people struggle to pay for basic necessities and health care. Community partnerships represent a good investment because they foster collaboration among community players who work together to reallocate resources and meet needs more efficiently. We trust the "powers that be" in Haywood County will realize this and provide support to continue Haywood Community Connections.

WHAT HAPPENED TO.....

Do any of you wonder what happened to the programs that were administered by the Council on Aging? In 2006, when the Council on Aging dissolved, most of the programs were salvaged thanks to area agencies stepping up to the plate.

Several agencies had come together in 2004 as the Haywood Community Partnership and began work on an 18-month grant project. This same group later applied for a second round of funding and established Haywood Community Connections. These diverse agencies learned to work together for a common good. Therefore, upon the demise of the Council on Aging, it came as no surprise that these agencies stepped forward and amicably decided what program would go where based on the good of the community. Mountain Projects became the lead agency for Haywood Community Connections. The Faith In Action Program was incorporated into Mountain Projects' Safe at Home Program, and Mountain Projects also took responsibility for the Information and Assistance Program which continues to be funded by another partner, the Southwestern Commission Area Agency on Aging. The Community Alternatives Program (CAP) and the Adult Day Care Program became part of the Department of Social Services. Happy Wanderers as well as Senior Games and Silver Arts continue as part of the Recreation and Parks Department. Haywood County took over payments on the former MARC building and used it as county headquarters until courthouse renovations were completed.

Haywood Community Connections addresses many long term care issues and has a mission to equip and empower older adults to live productively in their own communities as long as desired and possible. While it does not have responsibility for direct service programs, it does take responsibility for bringing diverse groups together to promote collaboration and serves as a catalyst in bringing about change to the long term care system.
